Shoolman generosity funds childrens' programs and MLT Scholarship

While the mission of the Land Trust remains primarily that of protecting as much land as possible from development and preserving open space that it not our sole objective.

Developing environmental programs aimed at kids is also a goal of the MLT and, thanks in great measure to the generosity of the late Edith Shoolman, the available opportunities to do so in Mattapoisett would be the envy of many other environmental organizations.

"We're in a very favorable position," Land Trust president Gary Johnson said. "Most small land trusts don't have these types of funds available."

Gary was referring to the \$250,000 left by Ms. Shoolman for maintenance of the property that she willed to the MLT. That property included a waterfront cottage located on Brant Beach, the Shoolmans' longtime summer residence.

"Owning a house wasn't consistent with our mission statement so we thought we could use the proceeds from the sale to protect more land," Gary said. The house was subsequently sold but the funds for maintenance were still available.

While a small portion of that money was reserved for the upkeep of the lovely Shoolman

Park on Ocean View Avenue in Brant Beach there was a considerable amount left over.

"The executors of the will agreed that we could retain the balance of the maintenance money if it were used to develop children's programs," according to Gary.

To date the Land Trust has found a number of uses for this windfall such as providing

windfall such as providing buses for the Mattapoisett fourth-graders field trip to the Nasketucket Bay state reservation to visit the vernal pool.

Sixth graders were also funded to do vernal pool certification and high school students at ORR were involved in an estuaries program to do water sampling last year thanks to assistance from the Land Trust which paid for the four bus trips.

The Shoolman funds were also used for then creation of the new adventure playground that was officially opened this year at Dunseith Gardens.

"But we'd like to do more. I just saw that every third-grader in Framingham goes on an environmental field trip to Garden in the Woods for education to learn about ecology and systems. I think we should be doing something like that," Gary said.

The most recent proposal, now no finalized by the board, is to

being finalized by the board, is to provide a scholarship aimed at a graduating senior who plans to focus on environmental studies. Candidates will be judged on what the have already done in the environmental field and also on what they hope to do when they continue their studies.

A recent reorganization the Land Trust's educational committee saw board member Ellen Flynn take over as chairperson and there will be a concerted effort in the months ahead to inform the community at large and particularly educators of the funding opportunities that might be available to support

their goals or special projects that are consistent with our own objectives.

"As the education committee chairperson I plan to reach out to local teachers to partner with them for their involvement in possible grant writing and other funding develop-

ment," Ellen said.

Under my leadership over the summer 2009 months, a subeducation committee met to formulate and establish an MLT scholarship fund.
By offering a MLT scholarship it is the Education Committee's goal to help assist a high school student in

furthering their college opportunities.

Along with Don Cuddy, during the summer 2009 I put together a plan to plant and maintain sunflowers and an herb garden at the Mattapoisett Historical Society on Church St. geared toward children. The MLT now has quite an extensive junior membership branch of the organization and with this in mind my goal is to engage these members to participate in our educational activities.

Expanding use of the estuary maps, which are used to show protected land in Mattapoisett and to show the MLT plan to develop a continuous trail from highway 6 to the harbor.





With your help in June of this year we were able to complete the acquisition of the Dunn Preserve, the 40-acre parcel lying along Old Slough Road between Angelica Avenue and Bowman Road. As we mentioned in the spring Heron, adding the Dunn Preserve gives us a contiguous 215 acres in


Kids' Corner Time for Tracking


Winter and early spring bring us plenty of snow and mud, the perfect environment to find tracks of the mammals that make Mattapoisett their home. A couple of years ago in early March we found tracks of a fisher near the Grace Pond at the end of Bowman Road.



The fisher is a large member of the weasel family getting up to 45" long and weighing up to 11 lb. (The largest ever recorded was 20 lb.) They usually make their dens in hollow trees and will eat anything they can catch including rabbits, other small mammals, and birds. They are one of the only animals that will attack and kill a porcupine.

Unlike other mammals that move by walking or waddling or hopping, the weasel family moves by bounding as shown:

To give you an idea of how large a fisher is, the track shown is life-size. These drawings are taken from Mammal Tracks and Scat published by Heartwood Press. You can get your own waterproof copy at www.heartwoodpress.com. You'll be surprised to see how many different mammals included in the guide you can find in Mattapoisett.

So put on your coat and boots and go explore the outdoors this winter and spring. The cold weather gives us a great opportunity to investigate nature and not worry about deer ticks.

Holiday Stocking Stuffers from the MLT

The Mattapoisett Land Trust is now your source for small holiday gifts. If you want to help Mattapoisett preserve environmentally sensitive land, preserve open land for future generations, and help the environment, consider purchasing small holiday stocking stuffers from the MLT. These are the same items which have been a big hit for the past five years at Harbor Days. They can now be purchased for the holidays. Five items are available this year: adult and children's shirts, adult hats, an aluminum water bottle, a Salty decal and a Salty pin. These items are shown in the accompanying 6

The Salty stick pin is green on brass and can be seen in picture 1. The Salty decal measures 2 inches by 3 inches and is black on white. It can be seen in picture 2. The Aluminum water bottle shown in picture 3. has the MLT logo stenciled on the side.

The children's shirts are powder blue with a green emblem of Salty on the front and nothing on the back. The adult shirts are green with a cream color logo on the front and on the back (see picture 5a and 5b). The shirts are short sleeve, and are available in many sizes, see table I. Finally the shirts are made from organic cotton (cotton grown using only natural fertilizers and pesticides).

The last items are baseball hats, They are available in two colors, red and tan. Both hats are one size fits all with an adjustment strap in the back.

"Protected Spaces" Maps Available

Whenever we make a presentation to groups about our land protection efforts (including during Harbor Days) we use large maps that show all of the protected land in Mattapoisett. Over the years several individuals have inquired about how they could acquire copies of the map. Unfortunately we have neither the software to create the maps nor the hardware to print them — they are created for us as a public service by the Buzzards Bay National Estuary Program in Wareham.

While we cannot create new maps for members, we can distribute the old maps after we have used them for our land protection activities — we prefer to recycle them rather than adding them to a landfill. To this end the Directors have authorized the distribution of the old maps to members in good standing on a "first come, first served" basis. We will keep a list of interested members and, as the maps become available, we will contact the member to arrange a delivery.

All of the maps are large, measuring 44" by 34". We have two different styles: one shows individual land parcels with an overlay of the "DEP Core Wetland Resources"; the other uses an aerial photograph of the town. Both have color grids that show land held by the MLT, other land trusts, municipal bodies, and the Commonwealth. To protect the maps for display purposes, we have one set laminated in plastic.

Everyone loves maps and with your own "Protected Spaces" map you'll be able to track our efforts as we try to protect some of what make Mattapoisett "special".

Vernal Pool Training and Certification

Since our spring issue of The Heron won't appear until April, we thought we should give you an early notice of an educational event we have planned for the spring. We have tentatively scheduled a workshop and field trip to give the public hands-on experience with certifying a vernal pool. Elizabeth Leidhold, MLT Director, will provide the background information about vernal pools- their characteristics and importance- at a workshop on Wednesday evening at the Mattapoisett Free Public Library. She will then lead the group on an exploratory visit to Grace Pond on Bowman Road on Saturday morning where we will complete the documentation necessary for obtaining state certification. Our goal is to give more Mattapoisett residents the tools necessary to protect these critical wetland habitats. Stay tuned for more information.

First Saturday of each month, 1:00 P.M.

Join us the 1st Saturday of each month for cleaning up the MLT properties and preparing them for winter. We'll meet at Dunseith Gardens at 1pm and then proceed to the property where work is most needed. Leaf rakes, leaf blowers and plastic trash barrels are especially useful in moving leaves and branches to the composting piles.
