## Land Preservation Updates

Dunseith Gardens

Home of "Salty" the Mattapoisett Sea Horse, Dunseith Gardens, located on the corner of Route 6 and North Street, holds a prime location for orienting visitors to Mattapoisett, as well as reminding us of days gone by. Thanks to the coordinating efforts of Charlie DuPonte, a beautiful gazebo donated by Mike Esposito and his wife, Cynthia Redel, has been added to the property. You may also have noticed several log benches along the Dunseith nature trail. Thanks to Kevin Wheeler who, with the help of his fellow scouts and the leaders of Troop 53, fulfilled the service project requirement toward his Eagle Scout Badge. It was a lot of work, and we know these benches will be appreciated for many years to come.

A Sign of the Times. . .

MLT has partnered with the Mattapoisett Lions Club to bring you a community bulletin board, located across from Dunseith Gardens on Route 6. This bulletin board will provide information on upcoming community events of interest. We'll complete this project with some landscaping in the spring.

Trail Blazing. . .

The Martocci preserve, donated by Ruth Martocci in 1993, provides 97 acres of mixed woodland for your enjoyment. Accessed from Rte. 6, across from the Friends Meeting House, an approximately mile-long trail has been marked by the MLT for exploration. Take a walk, and see what flora and fauna you can discover.

Tub Mill Refurbished

Last fall, the stone wall along the mill race at the Tub Mill property was repaired by Sherman Briggs after the engineering work was completed by Doug Schneider. In addition, in order to prevent future wash-outs, part of the stream bed was excavated and filled with large stone. We're lucky the work was completed last fall, given the amount of snow and run-off this winter.



Soaring housing prices, depressed cranberry prices and the extension of commuter rail lines south have all encouraged more rapid development of open space on the South Coast. In an effort to protect some of our most important open spaces, the MLT has joined six other South Coast land trusts and the Coalition for Buzzards Bay in the Saving Buzzards Bay Lands capital campaign. The purpose of the campaign is to raise \$10 million to preserve lands that will be held by the land trusts and to fund a \$2 million revolving fund to provide short-term financing for land purchases. As part of the campaign, the William Field family has graciously agreed to sell us a conservation restriction on 64 acres of forest, fields, and salt marsh along Brandt Island Cove. We are also looking at other purchases that could unite our many scattered holdings. As we engage in our fund-raising efforts this year, we hope you will help us generously. Remember, once it's developed, it's gone.

Agreement Reached on Bay Club Project:

As many of you know, the developers of the Bay Club golf course and luxury-home project and the environmental group Coalition for Buzzards Bay (CBB) have recently reached an agreement that addresses several environmental concerns. Here are some of the highlights:

- In exchange for the use of 100,000 gallons per day of Mattapoisett's sewer capacity, the Bay Club will pay for providing an equal amount of new sewer capacity for existing homes in the town's low-lying areas.
- In the event that the Fairhaven Wastewater Treatment Plant must be upgraded to meet EPA requirements, the Bay Club will pay Mattapoisett's \$300,000 share of the cost.
- The Bay Club will donate \$150,000 to the CBB, \$100,000 of which will be used to fund completion of a water-quality study of New Bedford Harbor by the UMass School for Marine Science and Technology. The remaining \$50,000 will be used for public education and advocacy related to nitrogenremoval technology upgrades at the Fairhaven Wastewater Treatment Plant.
- The Bay Club will donate \$12,500 to both the Whaling City Rowing Club and the Community Boating Center. It is hoped that support of these groups, which use the waters of New Bedford Harbor, will foster increased appreciation of and a stronger constituency for a cleaner harbor.
- The Bay Club will *not* swap land for Tinkham Forest, and has agreed to grant a permanent public-access easement across land owned by the Mahoney family that allows access to the forest.
