



Old Hammond Quarry needs your support!

MLT is working with the Buzzards Bay Coalition (BBC) to protect a beautiful 53 acre parcel at the junction of Route 6 and Mattapoisett Neck Road. The parcel is comprised of mature white pine, oak and holly forest as well as fresh-



water wetlands, along with an abandoned granite quarry. The quarry lies a short distance and easy walk from Mattapoisett Neck Road. The western boundary is directly across Brandt Island Road from the recently expanded Nasketucket Bay State Reservation and just north of the Bike Path.

The quarry was owned primarily by the Hammond family and operated from the early 1700's until the early 1900's producing pink granite for which Mattapoisett was well known. This stone was used to construct the town wharves we enjoy today as well as curbstones, foundation stones, boundary markers, and other cut stone uses seen throughout Old Rochester and beyond. MLT is working with the Mattapoisett Historical Society (MHS) to learn more about the quarry's history and its important role in the Town's development as a major shipbuilding port.

The entire property is mapped as Massachusetts Natural Heritage and Endangered Species Program (NHESP) rare species habitat, indicating the parcel's high importance to wildlife. And conservation would protect water quality in a number of small streams and springs discharging ultimately to the Mattapoisett River and harbor.

Following acquisition MLT, MHS and BBC will develop

a hiking trail network running throughout the property and connecting to the Nasketucket Bay State Reservation, the Bike Path, BBC's Shaw Farm Trail and other conservation land. One trail will lead to the quarry area and kiosks will be used to

explain the history and operations of this historic site. Watch for walks to see the property coming this spring and summer.



Town Meeting May 8

We need your support

In our efforts to raise the funds necessary for the Old Hammond Quarry acquisition we applied last year for a grant of \$75,000 from the Community Preservation Committee. As we go to press we have not yet heard whether or not they will recommend that our grant be funded, or if it may be a smaller amount. If the CPC approves the grant, the recommendation will require approval at the annual Town Meeting in May. We hope that you will make an effort to join us at Town Meeting and vote in favor of this grant application. The Old Hammond Quarry property has environmental, historical and recreational characteristics that make it particularly approriate for CPC funding.

Annual Meeting to feature eastern box turtles and a vernal pool

Marla Isaac from New England Reptile and Raptor Center will return this spring to introduce everyone to eastern box turtles (see Kids Corner, page 7), including live animals! These local reptiles are found throughout Mattapoisett but are on the state's list of species of critical concern. MLT's acquisition of the old Hammond quarry (see cover story) would preserve 53 acres of prime turtle habitat.

The day will begin with the opening of the new Buzzards Bay Coalition Tinkhamtown Woodlands Preserve between 26 and 37 Long Plain Road, and a short hike to the vernal pool found on the adjacent MLT Woodcock Preserve. The pool and woods should be teeming with spring life! Then we will return to Friends Meeting on Route 6 at noon for a pot luck lunch, a presentation by ORR marine biology students, and MLT's short Annual Meeting before Marla talks turtles. Festivities will conclude by 2:30 p.m. Come join us and meet the turtles!

Thanks to hard work by many volunteers, we are completing major improvements at Dunseith.

Kids' Corner

A Reptile with a Mobile Home

One of the reasons we want to protect the Old Hammond Quarry is because it provides a home for the Eastern Box Turtle (*Terrapene carolina carolina*), a species the Commonwealth has listed as a species of "Special Concern".

The Eastern Box Turtle is a relatively small turtle which only grows to about 6.5 inches long. Its upper shell (the carapace) is highly arched and is usually dark brown or black with blotches that are yellow, orange or red. The



bottom shell (the plastron) frequently also has a variable pattern but the most important characteristic is that it has a hinge. The hinge allows the turtle to protect itself by pulling completely inside and "closing the door".

Eastern Box Turtles live in woodlands as well as meadows and are present in other parts of the state but are most common in Southeastern Massachusetts, our neighborhood. They are omnivorous meaning that they eat both animals and plants; their diet consists of slugs, insects, earthworms, snails, mushroom, berries, fruits and vegetables- nothing that moves very fast.

Mating can take place any time between April and October but the females usually lay their eggs in June or early July in a nest dug into soft ground. She can lay between one and five clutches during a season, each clutch being from one to nine eggs. But she can also delay laying eggs for up to four years if food is scarce by holding the sperm inside her body.



The largest threat to Eastern Box Turtles comes from the actions of people: destroying habitat that it needs, capturing and removing turtles for pets, using ATV's and motorized vehicles in woods and fields and by hitting turtles on roads with vehicles. Old Hammond Quarry will protect important habitat but you can also help the turtles. If you see a turtle crossing the road, stop, pick it up and carry it to the side of the road in the same direction that it was heading. A quick, free ride will be greatly appreciated.
